Plans underway for 100th Anniversary

Mary Ann Rubis, Marge Cavanaugh, Pam Albertson, Patti Matthieu, Mary Knight, Liz Reeves, & Trish Pupek have been hard at work, making plans for celebrating the Centennial. Highlights:

Centennial Promotion

We have followed up with Committee Chairs to ensure they are incorporating the Centennial theme and icon in printed material, publicity and signage. If they need support, the committee is happy to assist. We have added the icon to our Facebook page and had a 2' x 2' Poster of the icon printed. We are looking at purchasing mugs or luggage tags with the icon to use as giveaways and to sell.

At the **January meeting**, members and guests made paper airplanes with the icon; \$25 was raised for Amelia Earhart Fellowship and \$115 for the Centennial committee's budget. In **February**, we will display our new poster on the Zonta table and include in pictures. Each bag for the Period Project will include a card with full color icon and inspirational message from Dee DiFatta. We are hoping to include student participation and get a good turnout. At the **Silent "no more!" Auction** in May, we will use icon on Program, bid sheets, etc. The theme will be incorporated in table centerpieces. Giveaway mugs or luggage tags can be included as auction items or sold separately.

Centennial Grant—We are looking for a partner – Mary will approach Elizabeth Dineen of the YWCA of Western MA about a project they are working on to make beds available for victims of trafficking.

Zonta Road Sign—<u>Patti</u> will measure the road signs and work with Roberts & Sons printer to create a metal version of the Centennial icon that can be affixed to the 3 signs by Patti's husband.

Centennial Club Award / Founder's Day in November—We want to make this a real special event, so we are seeking to find a special woman to honor by June so we can begin planning.

"100 Theme" —We would like to collect books on women role models for local libraries (with ZQV bookplate) – we could ask members and guests to help, create and publish an Amazon wish list, get donations, etc. We are getting suggested book titles from librarians.

Registry / Archive of club records—Need to clarify WHAT will be included (list – e.g., newsletters, lists of members; event programs, etc), what FORMATS to use – electronic files, photobooks (like Shutterfly), thumb drives, or all hard copies in special containers to withstand aging; and WHERE these records will be stored.

QV Common Action—We would love to work on a collaborative project with Girl Scouts, Kiwanis youth (Shanique connection), YWCA (Danielle), local schools, etc. Ears open!

Display Table/Board—Liz and Mary Ann are exploring ideas for upgrading how we show Zontians in action.

District 1 Nomination Committee News

OMARCI

A symbol of joy and friendship, the Zonta yellow rose celebrates its thirty-fifth anniversary this year.

The first of three Zonta breeds of roses was introduced at the 1984 Zonta International Convention in Sydney, Australia. That rose was developed by the world-famous Harkness rose nursery in the United Kingdom. Originally bred for the owner's daughter, Mr. Harkness graciously donated the rose to Zonta!

Since 1999, Zontians have acknowledged International Women's Day, March 8th, as Zonta Rose Day. On this date, members recognize individuals in their communities who are impacting women's lives by presenting them with yellow roses or items with its image along with information about Zonta.

In honor of this special Zonta symbol, the Foundation created the Rose Fund to finance any project/program not receiving the proposed dollar amount. Over the years, this unrestricted fund has proven to be very popular, with donations far exceeding its goal. Because of this support, reserves are being used to celebrate Zonta's centennial anniversary. \$112,000 from this fund will be used to award six international and 32 district/regional Women in Technology Scholarships. An additional \$300,000 will finance the Centennial Anniversary Grants, awarded to like-minded organizations partnering with Zonta clubs to improve the lives of women and girls in their communities.

Please consider making a donation to the Rose Fund on March 8th in honor or memory of a special person in your life.

White Ribbon Day is part of an international campaign called The White Ribbon Campaign.

Designed especially with men in mind at the time, this was created by a handful of Canadian men in 1991 on the second anniversary of one man's massacre of fourteen women in Montre-



al. They began the White Ribbon Campaign to urge men to speak out against violence against women. Today, the WRC is a worldwide campaign in 60 countries that has collected well over 5 million signatures and growing.

As part of this international human rights effort, the **Massachusetts White Ribbon Day Campaign** invites men and boys to be part of the solution in ending violence against women. On the first Thursday in March (3/7/2019), men throughout Massachusetts are encouraged to speak out to:

- # change societal attitudes and beliefs that perpetuate and make excuses for violence against women!
- # promote safety and respect in all relationships and situations!
- "From this day forward, I promise to be part of the solution in ending violence against women and all gender-based violence."

ADVOCACY

Zontians advocate at the international, national and local levels on issues related to human rights and gender equality.

- At the international level, Zonta International advocates on global issues primarily through the United Nations (UN) and Council of Europe.
- Nationally, Zonta districts, areas and clubs take action in support of, or in opposition to, legislation on issues affecting women and girls.
- At the local level, Zonta clubs monitor laws and policies and their impact on women, participate in Zonta Says No activities, and host workshops
 and events like tonight to raise awareness about issues affecting women in our communities.

SERVICE

International service is integral to Zonta International's mission Through these international service projects, funded primarily through agencies of the United Nations and other non-governmental organizations, Zonta International improves women's lives by increasing their access to education, health care, legal services and economic opportunities while supporting efforts to prevent and end violence against women and girls in all its forms. These programs and projects are made possible through donations to the Zonta International Foundation.

The International Service Program helps women in developing countries improve their legal, political, economic, educational and health status through training, education, health, sanitation, agricultural and micro-credit assistance to empower women to become independent and self-sufficient.

The Zonta International Strategies to End Violence Against Women (ZISVAW) program supports international service projects that promote and protect the human rights of all women and girls and work to end gender-based violence worldwide.

EDUCATION

To fulfill our mission of empowering women worldwide, we must focus on gender equality in education, an essential human right, critical to development for all. For women and girls, education provides the tools and resources to empower them to make decisions about their lives and the future of their families. Educated women can break the cycle of poverty; they can choose when to marry and if and when to have children; they can access quality health care to safeguard themselves and their children; they can educate their own children and ensure greater opportunities for future generations. Zonta International supports three programs for women and girls pursuing education and careers in the traditionally male-dominated fields of aerospace sciences and engineering, business and business management and public affairs. These programs are made possible through donations made to the Zonta International Foundation.

Amelia Earhart Fellowship expands opportunities for women pursuing advanced studies in the typically male-dominated fields of aerospace-related sciences and aerospace-related engineering.

Jane M. Klausman Women in Business Scholarship supports women pursuing undergraduate and master's degrees in business management.

Young Women in Public Affairs Award recognizes young women, ages 16-19, who demonstrate superior leadership skills and a commitment to public service and civic causes, and encourages them to continue their participation in public and political life. **New—Women in Technology Scholarship** encourages women to pursue education, career opportunities and leadership roles in technology.

For women living with homelessness or poverty, having a period is more than a hassle. It's a financial burden. Basic menstrual hygiene products are costly, especially for women struggling to support themselves and their families. Pads and tampons are considered "non-essential" by the federal government, so they are not covered by SNAP and WIC programs.

What's more, women and teens who are homeless often lack consistent access to hygiene products or safe sanitary spaces.

Workflow for Period Project

5 product categories to be added to gallon plastic bags (the monthly kit) are on long tables along the wall. They include (1) Tampons (2) Pads (3) Soap, wipes, cleansing cloths, sanitizers (4) Panty liners (5) Underwear

4 or 5 Work Stations

Six-person teams will work at round table, supplied with plastic bags.

5 people will be responsible for adding one product each to the bag as follows, then pass the bag to the left 12 tampons ~ 5 pads ~ 5 panty liners ~ 1 wash/cleaning item ~ 1 underwear (mark size on bag) The 6th person will add a Zonta information card with inspirational message and seal the bag.

The completed bags will be picked up by a runner and brought to the Packing Station

As supply gets low, individual working with that product will replenish supply from the long table or a runner might do that.

1 Packing Station (all remaining volunteers, rotating in and out)

Count out 25 bags and add to large trash bag or box. Add count to tally sheet.

Put filled bags/boxes with finished kits in hallway for transporting by car to shelters.

Heartfelt thanks to everyone joining us tonight; those who sent checks, notes and messages of encouragement for this project; and for all the angels who are helping us distribute these items to women and girls in need.
