On Monday, November 11, 2019 ~ in honor of Zonta International's 100th birthday ~ the club will celebrate a local woman who is not only a champion for women's empowerment, but an influencer and mentor for equality.

Dr. Mary-Beth A. Cooper, PhD, DM, became the 13th president of Springfield College in August 2013, bringing to the College her experiences from a long and distinguished career in higher education administration and community service and leadership. Zonta Advocacy at the UN and Council of Europe

Report from Pam Albertson, Advocacy / UN Chair

Periodically Zonta presents a “*Zonta Talk*” session about a topic relevant to Zontians. These are moderated discussions with expert Zontians followed by a Q & A period. You can attend in real time or view it at a later date. It is usually posted on the ZI website within a few days of the live presentation.

September’s topic was “Zonta Advocacy at the UN and Council of Europe”. Zonta advocates through its relationships with global political and civil societies as well as through its own projects and awards. These relationships give Zonta a voice in legislative development. Two of the global political organizations with which Zonta works closely are the United Nations and Council of Europe. You might need some explanation of these organizations – what they do and why Zonta collaborates with them. The discussion was 90 minutes and I’ll try to condense it into a brief summary for you. It is worth watching in its entirety however.

Council of Europe is Europe’s leading human rights organization, established in May, 1949. There are 47 member states and 6 observer states (one of which is the US); it represents over 820 million citizens of whom half are women and girls. All members must ratify and sign the European Convention on Human Rights. They are legally bound to the treaty which is overseen and implemented by the European Court of Human Rights.

The CoE headquarters is in Strasbourg, France, and consists of four bodies. The Committee of Ministers is the decision-making body; the Parliamentary Assembly is the deliberative body; and the Congress of Local and Region Authorities serves to include local residents. NGOs such as Zonta are granted a participatory status with the INGOs Conference of the Council of Europe. For your information, INGO stands for international non-governmental organization. Zonta has had its status since 1983. The CoE meets twice a year.

So what exactly is Zonta’s role in the CoE? In general, it represents Zonta in relevant discussions and decisions, and trains and educates members on issues pertaining to women’s rights and gender equality. Zonta also conducts country visits, participates in the monitoring mechanisms, and meets with NGO and political officials in those countries. Zonta’s representative is part of the working group on gender perspectives. Some examples of the work that is being done is the Istanbul Convention (criminalizes domestic violence, stalking, forced marriage, FGM, forced abortion or sterilization among other harmful activities) and the Anti-Trafficking Convention.

United Nations and its work are probably more familiar. Zonta has observers in New York, Geneva, Paris, Vienna and Bangkok where they observe conferences, draft statements and resolutions, influence legislation and the implementation of laws, and cooperate with member states to raise awareness of women’s issues. Zonta’s status with the UN is as “consultative status” meaning it has a “special competence” in its field of activity.

Zonta is one of the few NGO’s that substantially contributes to UN projects. In addition to the financial support, Zonta lends its expertise to member countries and other organizations. For example, “Strengthening Systems and Services that Empower Adolescent Girls to Say No to Child Marriage” is a joint project of the government of Niger, UNICEF (UN Children’s Fund), UNFPA (UN Population Fund) and Zonta. Zonta works with Soroptimist International, the Afghanistan ambassador and ACJS (Academy of Criminal Justice Sciences) on “Child and Forced Marriage in Humanitarian Settings: An Increasing Trafficking Issue?”

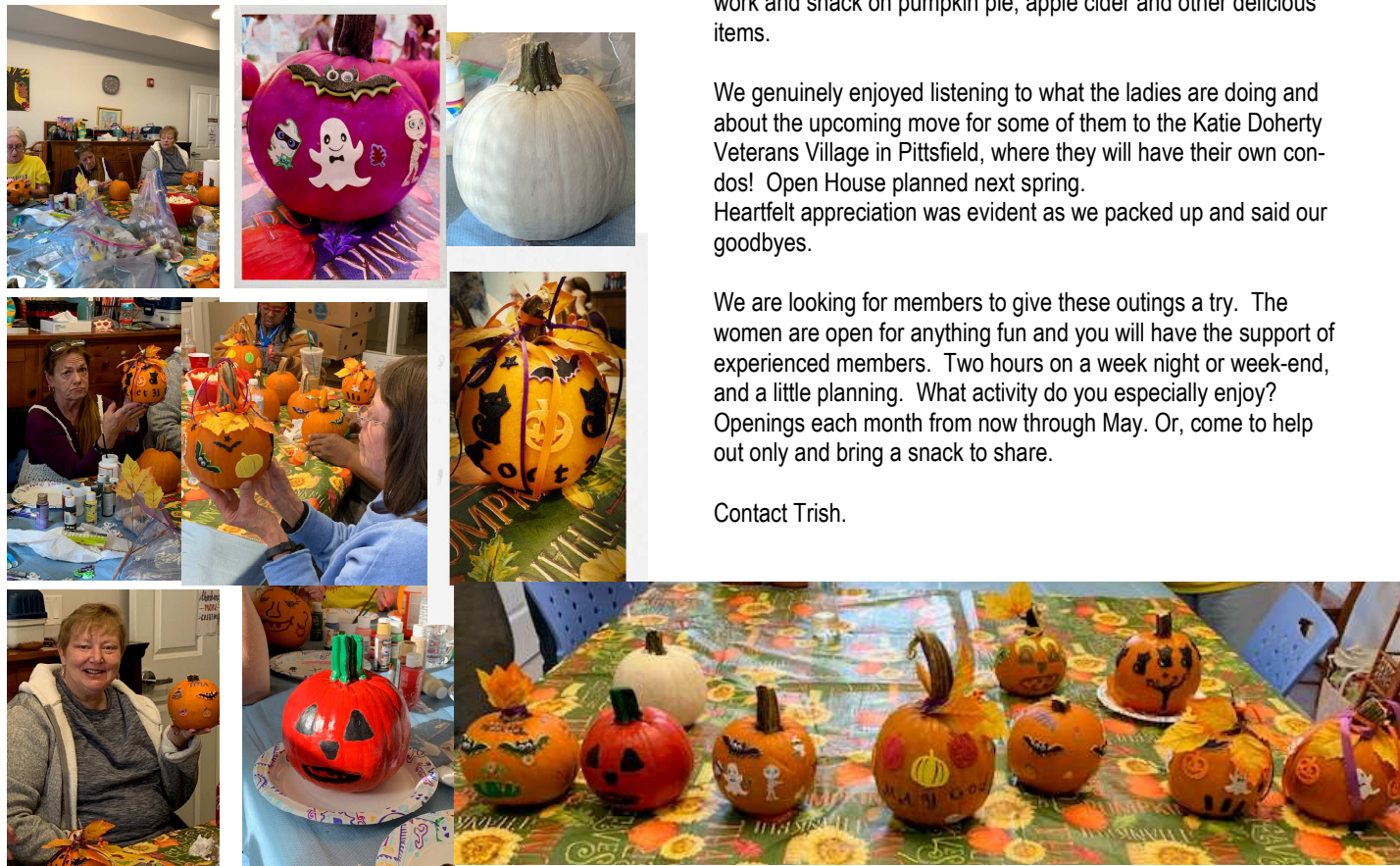
Upcoming milestones are the 25th anniversary of the 4th World Conference on Women and the adoption of the Beijing Declaration and Platform for Action in 2020, and the five year milestone towards achieving the Sustainable Development Goals. The 64th session of the Committee on the Status of Women will be held at the UN in New York in March, 2020.

I hope this gives you some insight into the importance of Zonta’s worldwide influence in addressing legislation regarding women’s issues and the effectiveness of that influence. I won’t list resources here but there are many links on the ZI website. Wikipedia is a good source for general information as well. Each organization I mentioned has extensive information available online.

Notices of the “Zonta Talks” are sent to members and I urge you to view them occasionally as you will learn a lot!

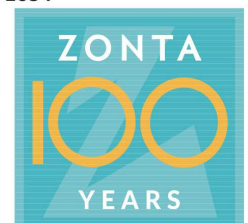

Zonta International District 1 Fall Conference November 8—10, 2019 Wakefield MA

Excitement is building for our District biannual Fall Conference—where members of Zonta clubs throughout the New England states USA and Nova Scotia CA will meet to celebrate the Centennial Anniversary of Zonta International, present special Centennial Awards and celebrate the accomplishments of Zontians, both locally and internationally. As this is an official conference, we will conduct the business of the district, elect our leaders for the new biennium, and welcome our District 1 liaison, Zonta International and Zonta Foundation Director -Margaret Bateman of Australia.

The weekend agenda is packed with opportunities for learning, celebration, introspection and fun.

Friday will start with a professional development Leadership Institute (3—6pm) where you can pick from a range of topics: The Role & Duties of the Treasurer, Conflict Management, Advocacy 101, and PR & Social Media. Sunday will start with a Memorial Service. The final Business Session begins at 9am. Featured speaker will be Youth Representative to CSW63, Aysha Emmerson. The conference will conclude at 12:15 with an invitation to the 2020 Zonta International Convention in Chicago.

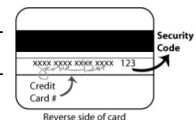

Zonta International Foundation, a 501(c)(3) charitable organization, is qualified under Section 170 of the Internal Revenue Service Code to receive gifts, grants, and contributions which are deductible for United States federal income tax purposes.
