Local Centennial Founder's Day Award Winner: Dr. Cooper

SPRINGFIELD, Mass – Springfield College President Mary-Beth Cooper was recognized with the Zonta Club of Quaboag Valley Founders Day Award, an award given annually to a woman in the community who not only represents a champion for women's empowerment, but also is an influencer and mentor for equality. Cooper received the honor at Zonta International's 100th birthday celebration on Monday, Nov. 11 at Ludlow Country Club.

"I want to say thank you so much to Zonta International, it's truly an honor to be recognized with this very special award during this centennial celebration," said Cooper during her acceptance speech at the award ceremony. "This award means so much to me personally because the work that Zonta International is doing around the world, and the difference its making in our communities, ties right into the Humanics philosophy and the mission of Springfield College, which is to educate students in spirit, mind, and body, for leadership and service to others."

Cooper became the 13th president of Springfield College in August 2013,

bringing to the College her experiences from a long and distinguished career in higher education administration and community service and leadership. With her leadership, Springfield College has experienced a rededication to the community service and civic engagement for which it is so well known, and has committed itself to building an inclusive campus that encourages engaged and diverse populations.

Locally, the Zonta Club of Quaboag Valley is working with survivors of domestic abuse and homeless women veterans, partnering in service with like-minded organizations like the YWCA of Western MA to further strengthen their missions.

"It's that service to others that Zonta is showcasing every day, every year, that really makes receiving this award so special," added Cooper.

The guiding forces in Cooper's career have been her vision for human potential and education as the answer to creating flourishing communities, as well as her own yearning for intellectual stimulation. Cooper has conducted myriad professional presentations in a wide variety of venues, and she is frequently sought to serve as a consultant in her field. She has given numerous presentations on campus security and personal safety, management trends in higher education, time management skills, and women's issues.

In addition, Cooper is very well respected among her peers in higher education.

"Mary-Beth has been a powerful presence in our community since her arrival as president of Springfield College," said Bay Path University President Carol Leary. "She is deeply committed to the success of Springfield College and unselfishly contributes her creativity, energy, and ideas to several major non-profits as well. We are also fortunate to have her leadership and her support for the advancement of women and the values of Zonta."



The Zonta Says NO to Violence Against Women 2019 Campaign

From 25 November through 10 December, Zonta clubs and members around the world will join together to say NO to violence against women. Find tools to help you plan your Zonta Says NO to Violence Against Women campaign <u>here</u>.

To begin, here is a short history of the Zonta Says NO to Violence Against Women campaign. It was launched in 2012 in order to raise awareness of Zonta's efforts to end violence against women and girls. Since 2015, the Campaign has utilized the Council of Europe's (CoE) Convention (the Istanbul Convention) as a framework and raised awareness worldwide to this first legally binding instrument to fight violence against women (VAW) and domestic violence. In 2017, Zonta clubs addressed trafficking in human beings as one of the most widespread human rights violations utilizing another significant CoE Convention: <u>The CoE Convention</u> on Actions against Trafficking in Human Beings, a comprehensive, legally binding treaty. Last month's newsletter had an article which explained the CoE's workings.

Starting in 2018, the focus has been on child marriage, one of the worst obstacles girls face in nearly every country of the world. Each Zonta club is called upon to create awareness of this harmful practice among their members and to the public. The goal is to achieve local and national government and community commit-

ment to fight child, early and forced marriage. You may be aware that early marriage is legal in much of the USA. New Hampshire recently enacted a new law banning marriage under the age of 18 for any reason. **Your turn, Massachusetts**. Gender equality is also vital to achieving the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development, which envisions a world in which "every woman and girl enjoys full gender equality and all legal, social and economic barriers to their empowerment have been removed." The 2030 Agenda asserts gender equality not only as a fundamental human right, but as a necessary foundation for a peaceful, prosperous and sustainable world. Child marriage is a strong deterrent to girls achieving their full potential as equal human beings.

The goal of advocacy is to influence the making and implementation of laws, as well as general attitudes and behaviors. It is important to determine the focus of the advocacy action in order to better identify specific actions to be taken. Prevention:

- Promote gender equal norms and violence-free environments in schools.
- Support programs that help men to change violent behavior.
- Request "safe cities": design/lighting of public spaces, safe public transportation, etc.
- Protection:
- Request One-Stop Centers with medical/legal/social help for victims.
- Promote short-term shelters and long term affordable housing for women and children. Support vocational training for victims to become self-supporting.
- Prosecution :
- Request laws that clearly blame perpetrators, not victims.
- Encourage the reporting of violence and give support to victims during legal processes.
- Promote the training of police and legal professionals to understand the issues.

Clubs are encouraged to participate in service and advocacy activities that focus on ending violence against women and girls throughout the year, but particularly during the 16 Days of Activism (November 25, International Day for the Elimination of VAW through December 10, Human Rights Day).

ZI is supporting one major project through the Zonta International Strategies to End Violence against Women (ZISVAW) Fund during the 2018-2020 Biennium: Ending Child Marriage. For more information search "Ending Child Marriage: A Programme to Accelerate <u>Global Action</u>", a project in cooperation with UNICEF USA and the United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA). By combining donations to the project with service and advocacy activities at district and club levels, Ending Child Marriage will have the potential to become a signature initiative for Zonta.

In honor of Zonta's 100th Anniversary and our most famous Zontian, the Zonta Club of Quaboag Valley is offering a special award in January, acknowledging six individuals who have overcome adversity and show the tenacious spirit of aviatrix Amelia Earhart.

High school guidance counselors from Belchertown, Palmer, Pathfinder, Ludlow, Ware and Monson each nominated a deserving student and these young women (and their quests) will be honored at

our January 13th meeting at the Ludlow Country Club.



Also joining us, as a guest speaker, is Grace Gerhardt—another young women who has a tenacious spirit! Grace graduated from Worcester Polytechnic Institute in May 2019 with a degree in Aerospace Engineering and a minor in English. She is part of the Quality Engineering Development Program at Pratt & Whitney, where she will serve three eight-month rotations in different departments of Quality Engineering. Currently, she assists Military and Commercial Assembly Quality for the F135 and PW1100 engines, respectively.

Grace chose her field of study based on her love of astronomy and passion for building things and figuring out how things work. Although her current position doesn't perfectly align with her major, her background in

aerospace engineering supports her in her every day job. She gets to have intellectual conversations with other coworkers and mechanics.

Naturally social and communicative, Grace enjoys her position because she is able to solve problems, im-

prove processes, and help people through creativity and communication. She hopes to graduate from her rotational program and place out in a more technical-oriented position, but is open to other opportunities where she can learn and grow.



The Amelia Earhart Fellowship was established in 1938 in honor of famed pilot and Zontian, Amelia Earhart. The US\$10,000 Fellowship is awarded annually to up to 30 women pursuing Ph.D./doctoral degrees in aerospace engineering and space sciences.

Zonta International District 1 Fall Conference November 8—10, 2019 Wakefield MA Delegate Report by Debbie Wood

Trish, Mary, Mary Ann, Joanne, Marge, Pam and I all attended the conference in Wakefield, Ma. Our own Mary Knight offered a Social Media and PR educational forum on Friday followed by a presentation on Advocacy 101, Strategy and Coalition Building workshop. We sold a # of T-shirts in the store and throughout the weekend for a bargain price. Just as we were assembling Friday for dinner Trish and 6 other Zontian were stuck in an elevator. Trish texted pictures and comments assuring us that like true Zontians they were taking this adventure in stride. Following a fire department rescue operation, Trish joined the diners starting with a well earned glass of wine.







At the opening ceremony and session Friday evening we were greeted by Governor Liz Hart, Margaret Bateman, International Director from Australia and State Senator Jason Lewis. Pam offered a Treasurer's Report that included voting that took place in the affirmative to make the temporary dues increase from last biennium permanent and to balance the district budget by accessing reserves. Then, there were brief speeches from all candidates for District Offices. A Zonta Centennial Celebration topped off the evening with a beautiful cake and refreshments for all to enjoy.

The Saturday Business Session included Area reports describing the many activities of all clubs but sadly including a mention of the now disbanded Burlington, Vt club. Foundation Ambassador Mary Ann Rubis provided a Foundation update on all projects and programs. She also noted that the D1 goals are to raise \$65,000, extend the district's string to six consecutive biennia of 100% club donations and, (in the spirit of the centennial), encourage 100% of our members to donate. As of the end of October, the district has raised a total of \$27,000, (42% of goal), with 30% of members and 75% of clubs making donations. The decision to forego the district's unofficial conference, along with the disbandment of two clubs and a decrease in membership is reflected in our overall total being 25% less than this time last biennium. Cassandra Levesque, the luncheon speaker, related her experience as a girl scout and advocate for the rights of young girls entering child marriages which all led her to becoming a NH state Representative at the age of 18. The afternoon included workshops on Gender Inequality and Climate Change, Maximizing Zonta's Visibility through Coalition Building, Vaping and the Effect on Youth and New Ways of Building Membership.

The gala evening included our very own Mary Ann Rubis and others wearing 1920's style dresses and headpieces. It was announced that our Quaboag Club was the winner of a free registration next biennium for the largest # of funds donated by Zontians not attending the conference. The Silent Auction of baskets and other items was followed by a lively live auction with models of each purse enticing members to bid high for a great cause. Our donated chocolate basket and purse earned about \$90 for the District and Zonta International respectively.

Sunday started on a somber note as a Memorial Service was held to honor and remember the 12 women who have passed on. Mary Ann provided an update on Foundation donation totals as well as the winners of the various donor incentives. For the third consecutive conference, members from the ZC of Halifax donated the most, with a grand total of \$800. Members donating \$100 or more were given the opportunity to guess the value of a rose bouquet made of money. Nancy Shambaugh had the closest guess at \$167 and won the bouquet. The actual value was \$170. Lt. Governor-elect Donna Sroka won a special prize for identifying the significance of the \$170 total: ZI chartered 100 years ago; District 1 70 years. Individual donations were \$4675, Club donations \$4155, (including \$1,905 donated by our club), Silent Auction \$115 and the Purse Auction \$1835, with Mary Ann's matching donation in honor of the ZC of Halifax a grand total of \$11,635 was raised over the weekend. The amount was the highest to be raised in the history of our district! With the club donations made at conference, we have achieved one of our goals - 100% of our clubs donating to the Foundation. This is the earliest point in a biennium that our district has met that goal. \$165 was also raised for the Centennial Endowment Fund. The Business Session included District Reports from Committees and featured Aysha Emmerson, a Zonta Youth Representative to CSW63.


