I am very excited for our Founder's Day celebration on November 14th at 5:30p at Ludlow Country Club. This year we are honoring Community Legal Aid. CLA is a non-profit organization that provides free legal services to over 7,000 low-income and elderly clients a year across the five counties of Central and Western Massachusetts, impacting an estimated 18,000 of the region's most vulnerable



residents – most of them women and heads of households. At the meeting we will hear more about this amazing organization and guests are more than welcome!

The 16 Days of Activism against Gender-Based Violence is an annual international campaign that kicks off on 25 November, the International Day for the Elimination of Violence against Women, and runs until 10 December, Human Rights Day. It was started by activists at the inaugural Women's Global Leadership Institute in 1991 and is used as an organizing strategy by individuals and organizations around the world to call for the prevention and elimination of violence against women and girls—like the Zonta Says No campaign. UN Women and Zonta-SaysNo.com sites encourage all of us to get the facts and take action during these 16 days!

Zonta of Quaboag Valley— October 10, 2022 Business Meeting

Members started arriving at 5:30 for social time. At 6:05 Dana welcomed everyone to the October Business Meeting. We shared the Zonta Blessing and enjoyed dinner.

Program: Pamela Barnes from Allianza began her presentation by thanking Zonta for its support over the years, especially for the Period Project and the grant our club gave them which was the seed money for some of the agency's programs. She then described some of the support programs Allianza (Spanish for alliance) provides. Among them are a hot line, a chat feature on their web site, an elderly advocate, a housing stabilization program, individual safety and counseling, and a court advocate, to name a few. Pamela stated that all programs and services are free to individuals seeking help.

Pamela continued her presentation by explaining how we can help victims of abuse. We can help by raising awareness of abuse; by not blaming the victim; by not ignoring the signs /red flags of abuse. She continued by offering suggestions for by-standers of abuse such as lending a hand to the victim; asking "How can I help?"; listening and not judging; checking in with the victim from time to time. Pamela also said that an overnight bag with basic toiletries would be helpful because most victims fleeing abuse come to them with nothing. She concluded her remarks by saying that Allianza's number one goal is to aid the person who is in crisis.

The second speaker for the meeting was Monica Moran from the Ware River Valley Domestic

Violence Task Force. She said that the task force began in 2000 as a result of the 150 to 200 calls a year that the Ware Police receive regarding domestic violence. The task force coordinates with Allianza so that advocates get involved with the victim. They work with the high school to educate the kids about domestic violence prevention. In addition, the task force works with local health care providers to educate them on what they can do to help. Monica said the task force looks at all the systems for how they can help and prevent domestic violence.

Business Meeting

Dana called the Business Meeting to order at 7:05.

Minutes: A motion was made and seconded to approve the Minutes as published in the Bog. The vote was in favor. **Treasurer's Report**: Sue Seaver reviewed the report as one was not available for distribution prior to the meeting. A motion was made and seconded to file the report for audit. The vote was in favor. Sue will send a copy of the report to Dana for distribution.

Founder's Day: The Founder's Day meeting will honor Community Legal Aid of Western Mass. The meal will be a buffet with a price of \$30 per person. Liz Reeves will provide flowers. Dana encouraged us to spread the word and bring guests.

Committee Reports

Poinsettias Fund Raiser: Dana spoke for Liz who was not in attendance. She said that the fund raiser starts after Thanksgiving. We will be selling medium and large Poinsettias. Order forms will be available for sales to local business and friends. Liz will need help wrapping the plants and delivering them. Dana asked those who are interested in helping to contact Liz.

Membership: Cyd said there is an organized, widespread effort within Zonta to increase membership, and we will be hearing ways how we can do that throughout the year. Right now, there is a basket of M&M candies (*more members*) on the foyer table. Each bag has a tip on how to increase membership posted on it. Cyd invited each member to take a bag and read the tip. She asked us to follow Zonta International and District 1 on social media for more information on membership. Cyd said to be sure to identify yourself as a Zontian wherever you go. Karen said that she is participating in the Sheriff's Shuffle and Debbie said she and Pam are participating in the Ware Domestic Violence Task Force walk.

Dana has some things for the raffle at the Founder's Day meeting. A brief discussion was held regarding having a 50/50 raffle the night and it decided not to do one.

Membership Committee – Tabling

On 10/25/22, Karen, Kerry, Liz and Mary met to talk about Tabling. The goals were to review a video and material compiled by Theresa Harris (ZI Membership Chair) and come up with a plan to use Tabling at all events and look out for opportunities to increase visibility in the community.

Before the Event

Plan to be recognizable from across the room. (Colors, Branding, Signage)

Choose one focus - one specific issue or program for the tabling event. Make it relevant to the audience at hand.

Have a "call to action" that relates to the chosen focus. Examples: ask them to attend an upcoming event, take a picture of a <u>QR</u> <u>Code</u> (qrcode-monkey.com) to learn more about a topic, sign a petition, take a picture of our scholarship flyer and share it on social media, pick up a list of DV resources and share.

Recruit and train members on how to approach and engage visitors. Have them role-play and provide feedback.

Advertise your presence at an event. Put up flyers, post on social media, and send e-mails announcing when and where you will be tabling. The more people know about your table in advance, the more people will stop by.

Gather materials.

Table (Karen), tablecloth and banner with the tagline.

Information on your focus displayed in a plastic stand or as a handout.

Have additional handouts (4x6 card that provides a good overview of the club, business cards, bookmark on the 'focus', plastic yellow rose or candy/granola bar with logo/URL tag, pen or post it note with logo, etc.

Ask them to "like" ZQV Facebook & Instagram to enter the drawing for a gift certificate – or fill out a card with name and email If appropriate and convenient – have laptop with video playing on the focus topic on continuous loop

During the Event

- 1. Wear your name tag, logo shirt or vest, and a smile.
- 2. Ask passers-by if they know about Zonta questions or something about the focus topic.
- 3. Make your call to action: Invite them to get involved!
- 4. Invite them to fill an entry for a free drawing (name, email address, phone) or like ZQV Facebook page for a giveaway.

After the Event

Follow up. Get in touch with the people who provided contact information at your table. E-mail will work, although a phone call can be more personal. The follow-up conversation is an opportunity to confirm their attendance at your upcoming event or make another ask, such as coming to a future club meeting.

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On October 22, the Annual Domestic Violence Awareness Walk was held at Veteran's Park in Ware. The focus was on creating awareness of domestic violence and honoring the victims who died during the year.

The highlight was a dinner table set with eighteen plain white place settings and black napkins with purple ribbons on a black tablecloth. On each plate was a written memory of a Massachusetts resident who lost their life during 2022 that told a little about the person and his/her manner of death. It's a very meaningful way to demonstrate the loss of a person who will no longer be able to "sit at the table".

Speakers included Monica Moran, Senator Ann Gobi, Representative Todd Smola and District Attorney David Sullivan. Other speakers included young women who are active in their high school to increase awareness among their classmates. Many attendees appeared to be family members of victims. After a brief ceremony attendees were invited on a short walk through Ware's downtown.

Other organizations were present to distribute information about programs available to help victims or potential victims.

Debbie Wood, Pam Albertson, and Cyd Melcher from our club participated in the event.





The Sheriff's Shuffle, a 5K run sponsored by the Hampden County Sheriff's Department, returned to the Ashley Reservoir Sunday for the first time in two years after being canceled because of the pandemic.

The event, which also included a 1.5-mile walk, raised \$100,000 in registration and donations. Proceeds will go to YWCA of Western Massachusetts to help provide housing assistance for victims of domestic violence.

Cyd Melcher had a table at the event to share information on Zonta. Karen Keough-Huff and her niece Grace participated in the event!

Did You Know?

That violence against women and girls is a problem of pandemic proportions?

Based on country data available, up to 70 per cent of women experience physical or sexual violence from men in their lifetime – the majority by husbands, intimate partners or someone they know. Among women aged 15 to 44, acts of violence cause more death and disability than cancer, malaria, traffic accidents and war combined. Perhaps the most pervasive human rights violation that we know today, violence against women devastates lives, fractures communities, and stalls development. It takes many forms and occurs in many places – domestic violence in the home, sexual abuse of girls in schools, sexual harassment at work, rape by husbands or strangers, in refugee camps or as a tactic of war.

That femicide is the murder of women, just because they are women?

In the United States, one-third of women murdered each year are killed by intimate partners. In South Africa, a woman is killed every 6 hours by an intimate partner. In India, 22 women were killed each day in dowry-related murders in 2007. In Guatemala, two women are murdered, on average, each day.

That trafficking is a lucrative industry?

Women and girls comprise 80 percent of the estimated 800,000 people trafficked annually, with the majority (79 percent) trafficked for sexual exploitation.

That harmful practices against women persists, implicitly sanctioned by messages in the media?

Approximately 100 to 140 million girls and women in the world have experienced female genital mutilation/cutting, with more than 3 million girls in Africa annually at risk of the practice. Over 60 million girls worldwide are child brides, married before the age of 18, primarily in South Asia (31.1 million) and Sub-Saharan Africa (14.1 million).

That sexual violence against women and girls has long-lasting consequences?

An estimated 150 million girls under 18 suffered some form of sexual violence in 2002 alone. As many as 1 in 4 women experience physical and/or sexual violence during pregnancy which increases the likelihood of miscarriage, stillbirth and abortion. Up to 53 percent of women physically abused by their intimate partners are being kicked or punched in the abdomen. In Sao Paulo, Brazil, a woman is assaulted every 15 seconds. In Ecuador, adolescent girls reporting sexual violence in school identified teachers as the perpetrator in 37 per cent of cases.

That rape has been classified by UN resolution as a method of warfare?

Approximately 250,000 to 500,000 women and girls were raped in the 1994 Rwandan genocide and the practice is ongoing in armed conflicts in the Congo, Darfur and Liberia.

..and now, sadly, you know and may better understand why "Zonta Says NO" to violence against women!
